

LITERARY TERMS PROJECT (50 points)

You must hand in this grading rubric with your project!

You must pick a **literary term** from Writer's Inc. (pages 233-243) or from the Internet. No student will share a literary term with another student this term. You must learn all you can about the literary term as **you will need to clearly write its name, define the term, include at least one example of the term in a piece of literature, and draw or find a picture representing or having something to do with the term on a poster no smaller than 11" X 17" and no larger than 24" X 36"**. You must also submit at least one typed, double-spaced page explaining the term and how your piece of literature is an example of the term. Make sure you use citations when using ANYTHING you did not do yourself. Cite the literature, the definition, paraphrases, direct quotes and any pictures or graphics. Follow the format you used for your I.S. Project or look in Writer's Inc. You will present the term to the class in a short speech, which will last no less than one and no longer than three minutes. Short presentations will be given all week beginning the day the project is due. Make sure you are ready, as I will draw the order of names for presentations each day until we are done.
